PART A: PUPIL PREMIUM STRATEGY PLAN

STATEMENT OF INTENT

At St Botolph's C.E Academy we set high expectations for all pupils in our school and believe that, with high quality first teaching, early intervention and targeted small group or 1:1 support, robust diagnostic assessment methods, quality social and emotional support, regular and effective engagement with parents and a personalised approach to meeting children's individual needs, every child can fulfil their individual academic, social and emotional potential.

Our Pupil Premium funding is allocated effectively each year to have the necessary impact across school to support pupils to achieve at least the same academic outcomes as non-disadvantaged pupils with similar starting points, and so that they have equal access to the extended curriculum and enrichment opportunities, reducing educational inequity. Our Strategy supports these aims by ensuring pupils receive high-quality teaching across all subjects, but with a specific focus on reading, writing, maths, phonics and as a Church of England school, Religious Education, including daily worship and a solid understanding of our Core Christian Values.

Our intention is that all pupils, irrespective of their background or the challenges they face, make good progress and achieve high attainment across all subject areas. The focus of our Pupil Premium Strategy is to support disadvantaged pupils to achieve that goal, including progress for those who are already high attainers. Our Strategy is also integral to wider school plans for education recovery, notably in its targeted support through the National Tutoring Programme for pupils whose education has been worst affected, whilst also including non-disadvantaged pupils.

We aim to embed the importance of cultural and arts opportunities in supporting the wider learning of disadvantaged students, enhancing cultural capital and removing barriers to accessing and understanding the wider curriculum. Our personalised curriculum, led by strong subject leaders, provides children in receipt of Pupil Premium, with opportunities to develop their confidence, independence and enables them to be successful learners, who will thrive in later life and make a positive contribution to society.

Leaders also use the funding to create opportunities for children to develop skills including resilience, perseverance, self-esteem through quality, targeted care for children and families. We work closely with external agencies, for example, Future in Mind, the Children's First Hub, and Educational Psychologists to support pupils socially and emotionally.

The strategies we employ at St Botolph's C.E Academy are evidence-informed using recommendations outlined by Education Endowment Foundation and the DFE. We were previously part of the One Wakefield Project, which focused on supporting and developing the opportunities and outcomes for Pupil Premium children across the whole Wakefield district and believe collaboration and sharing good practice is essential to providing the best future of our pupils. At St Botolph's we believe every child, regardless of their starting point, should not have a 'ceiling' placed upon them. We believe all our children can achieve anything, given the right support and direction, regardless of their ability, starting position or background.

CHALLENGES

(This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.)

Challenge Number	Detail of Challenge
1	Assessments, professional dialogue and observations indicate that our not all disadvantaged pupils progressing well due to non-engagement with reading, including home reading. Some pupils, including some who are disadvantaged, are not fluent readers and have poor comprehension skills.
2	As evident in entry assessments, some of our children, including those in receipt of Pupil Premium, have very poor early language acquisition and many are non-readers, with very limited word recognition and little knowledge regarding GPC and letter recognition.
3	As evident in entry assessments, some children, including those in receipt of Pupil Premium, have very poor early language acquisition and levels of communication are poor. Many of our pupils have speech and language problems and require SALT interventions. Many have limited experiences and exposure to reading materials at home and are therefore not exposed to a wider range of vocabulary, access to stimulating and engaging age appropriate books, access to libraries and the necessary technology to support them in their language acquisition.
4	Evidence from CPOMS and the work of our SENCO, Wellbeing Lead and Learning Mentor, shows that the SEMH needs of our pupils has declined, especially since the challenges of the Covid-19 pandemic. Many lack confidence, resilience, motivation and the necessary skills to overcome their challenges.
5	Parental engagement is often lacking for some of our pupils, including those in receipt of Pupil Premium. This is evident through our observations, pupil voice discussions and reading records and poor score in low stakes testing such as weekly spelling scores. Also, levels of attendance at parental events and workshops is often low, where we see parents of pupils who we know are well supported rather than those who are not.
6	Attendance data indicates that the attendance of some of our Disadvantaged pupils is below that of other pupils, with persistent absences remaining below national averages. Additional support is necessary to support these pupils and families to secure and sustain long-term improvements in punctuality and attendance.
7 (new in 2022)	Across school, pupils' arithmetic and reasoning scores remain lower than they should be. The Y4 MTC results in summer 2022 were also much lower than expected. Staff CPD is needed in order to ensure consistent delivery of lessons and implementation of mastery.

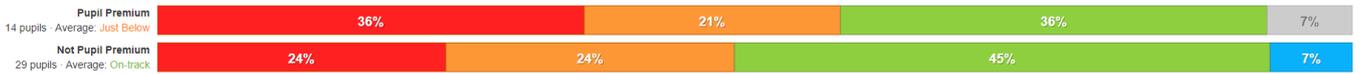


Attainment Overview for Pupils in Year 3 - 2022-2023 Summer 2 - Main Assessment

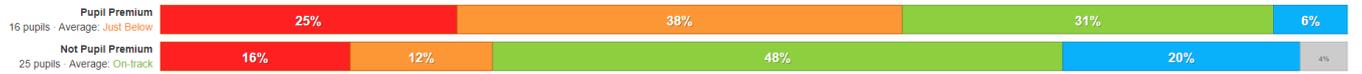


Attainment Overview for Pupils in Year 4 - 2022-2023 Summer 2 - Main Assessment

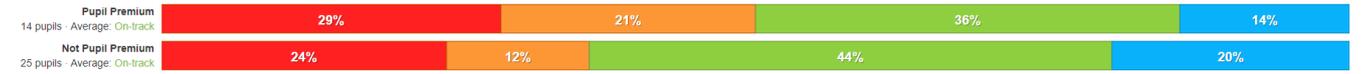


Attainment Overview for Pupils in Year 5 - 2022-2023 Summer 2 - Main Assessment

Attainment Overview for Pupils in Year 6 - 2022-2023 Summer 2 - Main Assessment

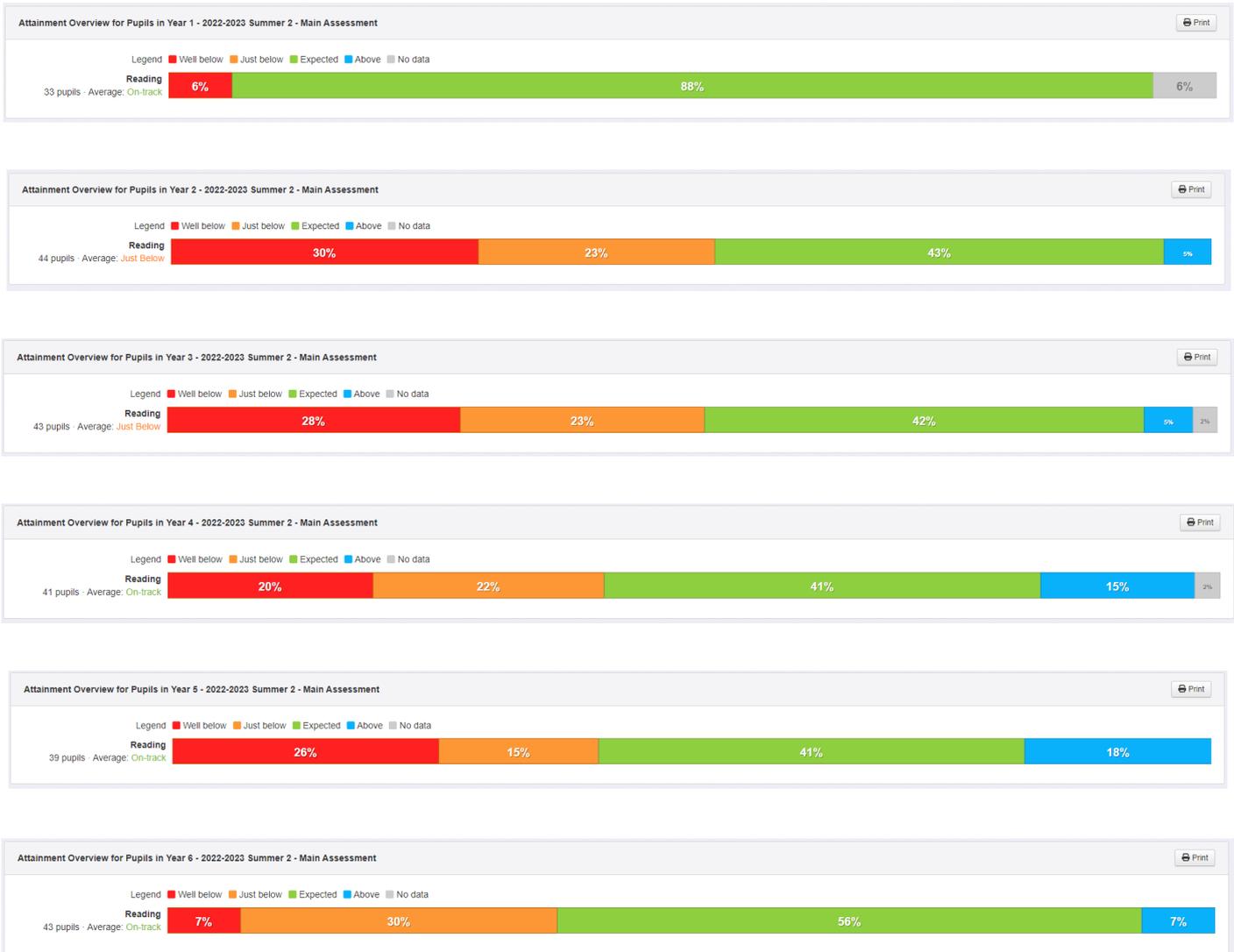

Approach includes: Word Aware sessions daily, Wellcomm is used as an assessment tool, SaLT interventions are used throughout EYFS and all adults have accessed SaLT CPD.

4. To sustain and enhance the support and development of SEMH of all pupils, including disadvantaged pupils in order that they achieve to their full potential and overcome personal barriers to effective learning.

Recent pupil voice surveys show that pupils feel safe in school. They also comment that the changes to the behaviour system means that there are less incidents of poor behaviour and that incidents are dealt with fairly. At least once an academic year, all children in school carry out a 'site walk' to identify any areas of school grounds where they feel less safe. Leaders then try to address these concerns, by either making changes to the physical environment, or by increasing the SLT presence in these areas at break and lunch times.

The KS2 SATs results in summer 2023 demonstrated how well supported this cohort was. The Y6 team, supported by SLT and the Learning Mentor, worked with the children to build their resilience and self-confidence. This led to improved KS2 results, which were in line/above national.

School records show a reduction in the number of low-level behaviour incidents, both within lessons and at playtimes and lunchtimes. The behaviour incidents which are reported/logged are for children with a specific SEND/SEMH need and detailed support plans are in place for these pupils.

5. To improve the attendance for pupils whose attendance falls below that of expected national levels, including persistent absences.

Attendance of Pupil Premium children remains 1.4% lower than Non-Pupil Premium and is 4.1% lower than the national average.

At the end of July 2023, children in receipt of Pupil Premium were PA which is a larger percentage per pupil in that demographic than not. However, at the time there were four Pupil Premium children on a phased reintegration plan.

In summer 2023, two year groups were highlighted as needing additional support with attendance (Y1 and Y3 from September 2023).

In planning our Pupil Premium Strategy (September 2021), we evaluated why activity undertaken in previous years had not always had the degree of impact that we had expected.

We triangulated evidence from multiple sources of data including assessments, engagement in class book scrutiny, conversations with parents, students and teachers in order to identify the challenges faced by disadvantaged pupils. We also used the EEF's 'Families of Schools' database to view the performance of disadvantaged pupils in schools similar to ours.

We looked at a number of reports, studies and research papers about effective use of Pupil Premium, the impact of disadvantage on education outcomes and how to address challenges to learning presented by socio-economic disadvantage. We also looked at studies about the impact of the pandemic on disadvantaged pupils. The pandemic has given us deeper insights into family life for those children from disadvantaged backgrounds and we have been able to forge stronger relationships with parents and carers as a result.

Prior to September 2023, we have been involved with the One Wakefield programme – a collaboration between Wakefield LA, Doncaster Research School (pre-2022), Bradford Research School (2022 onwards) and local schools (this ended in summer 2023). Through this we have studied the EEF's implementation guidance to help us develop our strategy, particularly the 'explore' phase to help us diagnose specific pupil needs and work out which activities and approaches are likely to work in our school. We will continue to use it through the implementation of activities.

We have put a robust evaluation framework in place for the duration of our three-year approach. This will help us to make adjustments to secure better outcomes for pupils over time.

Our Pupil Premium Strategy will be supplemented by additional activity that is not being funded by Pupil Premium or Recovery Premium.
